

At the beginning of the year, the children thoroughly enjoyed taking part in the Nativity production with Cedar class. Their singing was amazing, alongside their brilliant dance moves in the sheep and angel songs!

They have been on many trips, including to Sacrewell Farm, where they got to see and stroke a variety of different animals, as well as learning how to care for them.

During the Spring term, they visited Rutland Water, where they took part in a variety of activities to encourage them to explore their local area.

They have also recently been lucky enough to go to Catmose College to create some 'fairy-tale toadstools' – the end products were fantastic!

Overall, it has been a very busy year in Beech class, but one that all children and staff have thoroughly enjoyed!



# CEDAR CLASS

In term one Cedar class went on a trip to Uppingham Theatre to watch *How to Hide a Lion*, this fitted in nicely with our Beat Band Boogie topic which looked at all things musical.

In Design Technology the children created their own musical instruments which they used in our sharing assembly. In geography we explored the local area and walked into Oakham. The children were able to retrace the route and identify it on a map of Oakham. The children also began their swimming lessons this term.

In term 2 our topic was Towers Tunnels and Turrets, we became experts on everything you needed to know to become a knight. We also read the book 'Snuff' by Quentin Blake, about a young man wanting to be a knight. He gets things very wrong and discovers that becoming a knight is not as easy as he thought. This topic also took us to Oakham Castle where we spent the day experiencing life in medieval time. We were able to eat at the banqueting table in the great hall, make our own table decoration, make a trebuchet and learnt how to fight like a knight.

Our Street Detectives topic found us exploring the streets of London during the great fire of 1666.

The children learnt about how the fire started and the rebuilding and design of the London we know today. We enjoyed a book called 'Fire Cat' by Pippa Goodhart and found out about the diaries of Samuel Pepys. We went out and about in Oakham to look at different types of houses and how they have changed over time. We had a visit from Walkwise who told us about road safety and how to stay safe when walking around Oakham.

In science we looked at seed dispersal, we also planted our own seeds and looked at different types of growing conditions, we also learnt about Hydroponics and tried to grow seeds in plastic bags without soil.

Term four found us 'all at sea' with our Land Ahoy topic. 'Pirate Blunderbeard the Worst Pirate Ever' was a great book and taught us how **not** to be a pirate. We learnt lots of interesting facts about pirates, we also found about famous sea heroes and heroines like Captain James Cook and Grace Darling. We had a visit from members of the RNLI who gave us some great tips on how to stay safe near water. They also told us more about Grace Darling and how she rescued survivors of the Forfarshire, we even got to dress up and re-enact the story.

Term 5 was very busy with our SATS Special Agent Training. Our topic was 'Wriggle and Crawl' and we managed to find out lots of information about 'mini beasts'. We spent a lot of time dancing and preparing for our Car Wash inspired May Day dance. In English we looked at lots of different poems, Michael Rosen's Chocolate Cake was a favourite, we used the information we had gathered on mini beats to help us write our own poems.

For term 6 our topic is Bounce, this has made us very sporty. We have been creating our own games in groups and then showing the other groups how to play our games. We have played rounders and trained in preparation for sports day. We have carried on reciting poems and looking at rhyming words and alliteration to make our poems better. We have been busy organising an afternoon tea to raise money for the RNLI our way of saying thank you for a great afternoon in term 4. We baked cakes and biscuits and wrote the instructions for our recipes. On our recent trip to Rutland Water we made kites and learnt how to play golf.



